STOP PRESS! Just before Easter a bad infestation of Myrtle Rust was discovered in Blackburn South. Extra vigilance required!

Myrtle Rust,

Myrtle Rust is a devastating disease which attacks the Myrtaceae family including eucalypts, tea trees, and bottle brushes. Its recent arrival in Victoria has triggered major alarm. It is a fungal infection which exhibits a few different stages from a brown rust with a purple hue around it to yellow pollen balls on both sides of the leaf, and then the leaf begins to curl.

Please keep a sharp look out in gardens and parks. **Do not touch it** as it spreads very easily on hands and clothing, but immediately contact -

Good News for the Bushland

Blackburn Lake Sanctuary Advisory Committee is immensely pleased with the huge response to **Clean Up Australia Day**. 85 volunteers resulted in 19 bags of rubbish collected by individuals, family groups, work groups, 11th Box Hill Cub Scouts and Sathya Sai Centre of Nunawading (who also generously brought morning tea for all). "There wasn't a skerrick of rubbish left on the Lake edge; it was amazing" voiced a visitor.

Bad News for the Bushland

Most people dispose of their rubbish responsibly, but in several forms it remains a problem for the bushland parks.



Much litter is **water born**, especially **plastic**, which dropped in surrounding streets, washes into the Lake and on into the Creek (... then the Yarra and the Bay!).

Two little fledglings were found in Kalang Park, outside their nest, upside down, and dead; their tiny legs entangled in the blue plastic twine their parents had used for nest building.

Smokers who drop their butts!!

Hard to believe but true - the environment is stuck with that butt for up to **15 years** before it breaks down, meanwhile leaching nicotine and other toxic chemicals into the soil and water. It would be great if smokers would carry a personal ashtray to put their butts in, rather than dropping them where they stand.

Dumping garden waste in the parks . . .

Spreads invasive weeds which compete with indigenous plants

Suffocates the plants it's dumped on

Spreads diseases from prunings

Is unsightly

Pollutes water and promotes algal blooms as decaying vegetation is washed into the waterways

Can be a fire hazard

Piles of grass clippings heat up as they decay, nurturing damaging fungi and bacteria

It is very discouraging for the staff and volunteers who maintain the parks, as the rubbish has to be removed

Composting,

Mulching,

Worm farms, or the
Council Green Bin collection



Grasses Expert

Dr Graeme Lorimer

spent an informative and productive morning with members of the Blackburn Creeklands Advisory Committee in December, identifying grasses and plant communities in Blacks Walk, and advising about future management.

The Committee was delighted to learn the already highly valued stand of grass at the top of the hill is actually *Stipa rudis sub species australis*, which is classified as threatened. This patch is flourishing!

Near the Garie St playground Graeme identified patches of Matgrass *Hemarthria uncinata*, now rare in the eastern suburbs and this is thought to be some of the last remaining in Whitehorse.

Many areas re-vegetated in recent years have begun to regenerate themselves and become functioning ecosystems – always the goal in a bushland park.

Birds in the Bush

The birdlife at the Sanctuary, in the Creeklands, and surrounding gardens has been enjoying the lush recovery after many years of drought. Visitors to both bushland parks have been delighted to glimpse pairs of Buff-banded Rails with young, creeping quietly through the undergrowth; the first sightings of this species for decades!

Other special sightings have been two Little Lorikeets, and a Yellow-faced Honeyeater, neither recorded since 1974; the Scarlet Robin is visiting again, and another Yellow Rosella has been spotted after a five year absence (looks just like a Crimson Rosella, but is yellow). The Powerful Owl was seen near the Lake just before Easter, and the handsome, raucous Gang Gangs are back, en masse. Also King Parrots and Long-billed Corellas are being seen.

Some species have bred extremely well this season ~ 15 Nankeen Night Herons (all at one time), 30 Wood Ducks grazing on the lawns, 24 Eurasian Coots bobbing along in the lake, and the Black Ducks and Chestnut Teals were seen with large broods in tow. Superb Fairy Wrens and acrobatic Eastern Spinebills are being seen in greater numbers and in more locations.



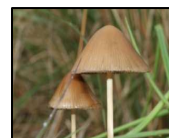

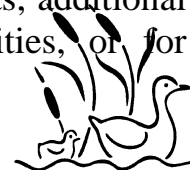
