

## A Word from Wandinong Sanctuary ~

*The first of regular contributions from Wandinong*

Wandinong Sanctuary is an area of remnant bush in Canterbury Road South Blackburn, which was bequeathed to the former City of Nunawading by Janet and Arthur Hooke in 1973. A plaque in the centre of the Sanctuary commemorates the house, which was built by the Hookes in 1914, and demolished soon after Council acquired the land. Wandinong Sanctuary was officially opened on 9<sup>th</sup> May 1976.

Nunawading Council appointed a Committee of Management in 1973, which has always included two representatives of the Blackburn & District Tree Preservation Society (a requirement of the Deed) and two representatives of the Hooke family, as well as local residents. It is now known as Wandinong Sanctuary Advisory Committee.

**Wandinong Sanctuary Working Bees** are held at 2 pm on the third Saturday of each month to carry out various tasks, according to the season. Everybody is welcome. On-the-job guidance provided!

### Working Bees

Blackburn Lake Sanctuary and Blackburn Creeklands will both kick off with the **BIG Clean-Up Australia Day on Sunday 1st March**. Other scheduled working bees are listed elsewhere in this newsletter.

Working bees are not *just* work, but an opportunity to chat and share interests, find out about indigenous plants that will suit your garden, and what pest plants to avoid. We also see some of the most amazing insects, and birds! Your help at any of our working bees will be greatly appreciated, and your work will make a difference to the bushland.

### **WEEDS. . . . So what's the problem?**

As residents living close to bushland areas like the Creeklands, Wandinong Sanctuary & Blackburn Lake Sanctuary, we need to be aware which plants growing in our gardens can escape to become major bushland weed problems. The Advisory Committees and Council Parkswide staff are ever vigilant for outbreaks of major weeds such as the Chilean Needle Grass found recently (and removed) in Furness Park, and Water Hyacinth which can quickly infest our waterways.

Fluffy seeds from daisy-type flowers, thistles and grasses have evolved to be spread by the wind. Removing dead flower heads before they go to seed can prevent this spread. Birds are particularly good at distributing the berry-type seeds from cotoneaster, privet, and pittosporum to name just a few! Removing seeds from large trees is not a viable option, so replacement with an equivalent indigenous species may be the solution.

Many plants also take root easily from a just tiny fragment, and from little things, big things grow! The smallest piece of wandering creeper, ivy or blackberry can wash down the gutters or spill from the bin, take root elsewhere, and away they grow!



Some plants, like ivy, are multi-pests! Birds love their seeds, they fragment easily, their underground root system can be very extensive, and when it reaches a fence, wall or that beautiful old gum tree, up it goes, flowering out of reach, clinging tenaciously, and suckering on through the bark to get to the nutrients and moisture being transported up the outer living layer of the tree to the canopy! It is our equivalent of the tropical strangler fig! If left unchecked, it effectively ring-barks the tree, most certainly killing it in the end.

This is to the detriment of the bushland birds and wildlife which rely on the connecting corridors of canopy in our streets to move safely from one bushland habitat to another.

Regular monitoring of these weeds in suburban gardens will hopefully be an early intervention to minimise an otherwise major task for the bushland parks.

\* **The splendid grassland on Blacks Walk hill** ~ Committee member Alan has worked there intensively for many years, removing woody weeds and exotic grasses, and it is a sight to behold! He says:

*"The predominant indigenous grass is spear grass (*Stipa*), which has proved to be very adaptable to the site. It is pleasing to see that other grasses have appeared in more recent years - wallaby grass (*Danthonia*) and weeping grass (*Microlaena*) the most common, with a little kangaroo grass (*Themeda*). The diligent removal of weed in areas abutting the high concentration of indigenous grasses has seen these grassy areas expanding, and the recent dry years have demonstrated the ability of the indigenous grass to out-perform the exotic grass. Re-establishing the native grass areas has also created the opportunity for other native vegetation to reappear. A great time to observe these grasses on the hill is late afternoon as the sun sinks in the western sky."*
